From the Executive Director

Another year has passed, but this year has been different. It is conference year. A year where we hope to see friends, old and new.

Planning a conference is complex but for me this generally starts with helping to design how the booking system will operate, and then I take responsibility for all bookings. I must ensure we have all the information we need; that payments are made and receipts sent out. Next, we send out the requests for workshop selections. From the replies we receive, we try to give as many participants as possible their first choice without exceeding the group capacity.

We now know who has booked, so it's onto the next stage of logistics. I prepare any documentation required, send out information emails, and ensure we have stock for our stall. Liaising with the venue to organise the bedrooms and inform them of any preferences participants may have is my next big task. Once at the venue I am the one who welcomes you and am available to help throughout the event. It is very much a team effort, and the result is rewarding for us all.

It has been an impressive 12 months for the website. We had 61,000 visitors in 2024 – the most since we began tracking in 2016. We've had 37,000 visitors so far in 2025, 50

it looks like the numbers might be even higher this year.

Our social media has also reached over 80,000 people in 2025, introducing retreats to a more diverse audience.

For the conference, we produced an online version of all the conference information in a mobile friendly format, making a step towards a paper-light, more sustainable event.

Over the summer, we will also be launching a Portal for Retreat Centres on the website. This will allow Retreat Centres to add and update their information, photos and events easily throughout the year, making our Online Directory even more helpful to people looking for retreats.



Meet our handbook typesetter!

I am privileged to have been involved in the production of *Retreats* for over 20 years. It is very satisfying to bring together all the parts of the journal, which takes around three months.

The typesetting job starts with the adverts in September collated and supplied by Clare either as finished artwork or text from which I create a design. The second stage is artwork for the articles, working with Caroline, one of the handbook editors. Third stage is to format the listings for each house entry, supplying proofs back to Alison, Managing Editor. Only after these are checked can the house numbers be added and work on the map started. Then I start to bring all the pages together, with cover supplied by Judy. That leaves the map index, editorial and index of houses and advertisers.

Proofing and amendments continue till early November, when the job is signed off as ready to print. PDFs are sent to the printer who supplies proofs back to Alison for the absolute final check. Inevitably there is a last-minute change to be carried out!

So what is my background and how did I get involved with *Retreats*?

As a teenager I had a Saturday job with my then Group Scout Leader who had a small trade typesetting and print business, where the job I enjoyed most was to melt down the used type and cast it into ingots ready for use the following week. I served an apprenticeship as a compositor, attending London College of Print on day-release for 5 years, learning hand composing, linotype and monotype hot-metal typesetting and then film-setting.

In my mid-20s I became manager of an artwork studio at a printers in Henley-on-Thames, then General Production Manager.



It was an exciting period for typesetting, moving on from photo-typesetting, to laser-typesetting of complete pages direct to film, ready for platemaking. Time came to move on and I started my own business in Newbury. In 2008 my daughter Nikkie joined me and she now runs the business.

I am an Elder and Church Secretary at Thatcham United Reformed Church and my link with the Retreat Association came about through a minister who was our Interim Moderator during an interregnum. He was Chairman of URC Silence and Retreats Group and also involved in the Retreat Association. When the designer for *Retreats* emigrated, he introduced me to Paddy Lane, the then Executive Officer, and after submitting prices and meeting the editorial committee both in London and Newbury, I was asked to take on the job! At the time it was an A4 magazine. but when Alison became Director of the Retreat Association in 2008, she brought new ideas with her resulting in the lovely journal you can now refer to all year round.

Since our last minister retired, being Church Secretary takes up a lot of time. However, I am a passionate motorcyclist and last year passed my Masters test for the Institute of Advanced Motorcyclists. Fortunately my wife Gill shares my interest and we tour frequently on the bike in Europe and the UK.

At our AGM Carol Smith stood down as Chair and Trustee of the APR in order to explore new patterns of ministry in her retirement. I was then appointed as her replacement. Nicholas Buxton

also resigned as an APR Trustee in October to focus on new developments at St Antony's Priory. We are grateful to Nicholas in designing and building our new website and to Carol for her leadership of the APR over the last two years. Bishop John Stroyan has generously offered to return to the role of President until at least the APR conference at the end of April 2026.

In July 2024 the APR opened our Bursary Scheme to applications from both Retreat House Wardens and Headteachers/Teachers in Church of England schools. As trustees we hope that these initiatives will assist those working under huge pressures to access the peace of retreat houses.

The Revd Dr Andrew Mayes led our October retreat at St Katharine's Parmoor based on his book, *Beyond the Edge*. He used the geography of the Holy Land and the

transitional journeys that Jesus made during his ministry as metaphors for our own lives. Fourteen people attend the retreat.

The APR trustees have agreed to support a second annual retreat each year. In March 2025 Demelza Henderson and Helen Evans led a Poetry and Prayer retreat at Sheldon, Devon. The retreat was entitled, 'Dark earth, bright field', and explored the metaphors of light and darkness as expressed through the Bible and secular poetry. The retreat was fully booked, and the trustees are delighted that Helen, Demelza and I are working together next March for a second APR retreat.

In April 2026 the APR will offer a conference at Launde Abbey on the theme of spiritual wellbeing. The conference is being planned to offer a forum for Diocesan Spirituality Advisers, Co-ordinators for spiritual direction training and Wellbeing Officers. Representatives from every diocese will be invited to attend.

The APR continues support those seeking to explore spirituality through taking retreats, the work of retreat houses and retreat leaders, whilst at the same time supporting our ecumenical partnerships with other retreat charities.

We are now blessed in the leadership of Pope Leo with his unique experience of ministry and the wisdom of his Augustinian heritage. We welcome him as a source of hope for the future.

CSN continues to appreciate all of the retreat houses and centres of spirituality offering spaces for us to listen to our lives and to find God's presence, often where we least expect. We recognise all those who support others through spiritual accompaniment, those attentive to the edges of our stories where life and growth abound.

Reflect - Methodist Spirituality and Retreats



This last year seems to have flown by. Here's what we've been up to in Reflect:

We have continued to offer two well-supported retreats at places in

Northern England and the East Midlands. Plans are in hand for Autumn 2025 at Minsteracres and February 2026 at Launde Abbey.

Unfortunately, our planned summer 2025 retreat in the South of England has had to be cancelled. We had only received a handful of enquiries at the decisive point in time.

Online Quiet Mornings have continued to be a popular feature. These will be increasing from three to four per year from September. There were a few more sessions last summer of our online 'Take Time' (Ignatian style meditation) and, in more recent months, a few people have joined an existing online group of mine for Lectio Divina sessions.

In relation to the Methodist Church, we have hosted, led or participated in the leadership of retreats for people in lay ministries and those exploring ordination. We continue to lead an annual Open Conference with the President of the Methodist Conference as our guest speaker. We stay alert for other ways in which we can make a contribution to the overall ministry of the Church.

In May, the Executive Committee held a 24-hour meeting followed by a retreat at St Mary's Convent, Wantage. Although our committee meeting was able to be in a hybrid format, sadly only a small group of us could meet in person and share the retreat, which was a time of blessing.

Moving on into the Autumn, we are on the lookout for a new publicity/media officer. It is a vital role in making our presence known and enabling participation by people both within the Methodist Church and beyond. Whilst we keep in touch with our membership via our newsletter, we know that numbers are gradually declining and need to make ourselves better known. We continue to work out who we are, what we can offer, and how we might roll that out in the current age. Our forthcoming AGM (27 September) will include consideration of our future direction. Last year we sent out questionnaires to members which resulted in a handful of replies. The Executive Committee will carry on weighing things up.

We value the prayerful support of all our ecumenical friends. And we extend our thoughts and prayers to you all.

Creative Encounters: Exploring Imaginative Paths to God

Impressions from two of our conference participants

How might the creative arts enrich the spiritual journey?

This was the central question addressed and answered by each of the speakers at the Retreat Association's 2025 Conference. From 16–19 June people from across the UK gathered at The Hayes Conference Centre, Swanwick, to meet, learn, worship and grow. Old friendships were renewed and new ones formed while enjoying the hospitality and beautiful grounds of the Centre.

We heard from speakers who themselves live at the crossroads of faith and art: Mark Oakley (poetry), Glen Marshall (film), Abbot Christopher Jamison OSB (literature) and Joanne Anderson (art history). Each of them gave their unique perspective on why our imagination is a useful and necessary tool that helps us to wrestle with ambiguity, articulate feelings and emotions, offer perspectives different from our own, open up space to appreciate and enjoy beauty and not least of all: join in God's creative process.





At the panel discussion on the closing day they were joined by Jacqui Parkinson who facilitated a creative and reflective space open to all in the Art Room. A beautiful textile from Jacqui's inspiring national touring exhibition 'Threads Through Creation' formed the central piece at the closing act of worship and other examples adorned the conference publicity.












Retreat Association Icon

Our icon of the meeting of Jesus and the Samaritan Woman at the Well has continued to be on display at a variety of venues across the UK thanks to the generosity of participating retreat centres and churches. Our hope is always that this beautiful icon is available for as many people as possible to share and we are delighted to receive offers from those wishing to display it.

The icon was hallowed at our conference in 2018 and since then it has been on display at no less than 30 retreat centres, 10 cathedrals, 9 churches or abbeys and 3 educational establishments. Last autumn the icon visited Worth Abbey in West Sussex, The Sisters of St Andrew in Lewisham and St Beuno's Jesuit Spirituality Centre in Denbighshire.

In 2025 the icon travelled to the Loreto Centre, near Conwy in North Wales, then on to St John's Church in Clevedon, Somerset. In June it was featured at our Retreat Association Conference at the Hayes in Derbyshire, where it was the centrepiece for our speakers. It was also the focus for two workshops led by David Wright, which explored what makes an image an icon, a brief history of iconography, and how to look at an icon to see its meaning through its materials, colour, geometry and the image itself.


From Derbyshire the icon travelled to the Dorset coast where it was the focus of a quiet day at Othona West Dorset. Over the next few months it will be travelling to Yorkshire, County Durham, Birmingham, Devon and Cornwall.
